Deposit varies according to type of equipment.

Items have been cleaned, disinfected and inspected for your use.

How It Works

- ü It basically works like a "lending library."
- ü Contact one of the people listed below with your need.
- ü If the item is available we will meet up with you to see if it fits your situation.
- ü Once we receive your deposit and complete the proper "Checking out" documentation you may take possession of the item.
- ü When you no longer need the item, contact us to set up a meet time.
- ü The equipment is stored at the church so that will be your pick-up and drop off location.
- ü One of us will be on-site to inspect incoming item, complete the "Check in" documentation and refund your deposit, if applicable.
- ü Do not just drop your item off if you want your deposit back.

Diluting the Gospel ~ 4

Liberty Department

Diluting the Gospel with External Viewpoints; Series Part 4 – The Philosophers Apostle Paul met in Athens

Before we move further, it will be beneficial if we do a little exercise. I will give you three sentences and you will try to guess which of them is Ethos, which is Pathos, and which is Logos. I will give you the answers below, but do not look at them in advance. Here they are: 1) “You have been caring the burden of poverty on your backs for many years but the time is coming when we will put an end to this.” 2) “This new school we build will raise the literacy level by 50% and will draw new jobs for the young to stay and raise their families right here in our community.” 3) “I will work responsibly until the poverty of this community is put to rest.”

Here are the answers: 1 – Pathos, 2 – Logos and 3 – Ethos

Let’s analyze now the discourses of the two titans of rhetoric and evangelism: Paul Acts 17:22-31 and Peter Acts 2:14-40. We will look at their speeches only from the viewpoint of the persuasion appeal – Ethos, Pathos, and Logos – something we just learned. The speech of Peter is not directly related with our topic of the Greek philosophy but, from the viewpoint of constructing a well-balanced personal appeal, it presents a wealth of knowledge and adds to the Paul’s. The two discourses are constructed very differently, targeting different audiences; they are unique and stand on their own. I believe we should study them carefully because in the time

we live in, it is likely we will be facing similar situations.

First, let us look at the Apostle Paul’s discourse - Acts 17:22-31.

Apostle Paul arrived in Athens to wait for Silas and Timothy. However, Athens was a different place; here he was hit by the refined worldly culture of the city. In the Spirit of Prophecy we read: “The city of Athens was the metropolis of heathendom. Here Paul did not meet with an ignorant, credulous populace, as at Lystra, but with a people famous for their intelligence and culture. Everywhere statues of their gods and of the deified heroes of history and poetry met the eye, while magnificent architecture and paintings represented the national glory and the popular worship of heathen deities. The senses of the people were entranced by the beauty and splendor of art. On every hand sanctuaries and temples, involving untold expense, reared their massive forms. Victories of arms and deeds of celebrated men were commemorated by sculpture, shrines, and tablets. All these made Athens a vast gallery of art.” “The Acts of the Apostles”

There were beauty and splendor everywhere but the city was given to idolatry and the people were actually ignorant of the true God. At first, Paul started his work in the synagogue discussing with the Jews. Then, he went to the market talking to the people “daily”. His primary work in Athens was to bear the news for salvation to those who had no intelligent conception of God. We read in the Spirit of Prophecy: “The apostle was soon to meet paganism

in its most subtle, alluring form.”

Soon, a group of debaters formed around Paul. Armed with his intellectual power, here, he had to match logic with logic, philosophy with philosophy, and eloquence with eloquence. It was obvious that Paul was not a novice and it was such a delight for the Athenians to debate him but in the same time he was bringing to their attention some troubling thoughts. Soon, the things started to change. The discussions turned more to a trial. Paul was looked as equivalent to Socrates because like him he was steering the philosophical thoughts of the people. Socrates was found guilty and sentenced to death for corrupting the minds of the young people of Athens and not believing of the gods of the state. Paul was counseled not to endanger his life and he took this into consideration. To defend his viewpoints, he was invited to debate on the hill of Mars or the Hill of Ares (Areopagus)

Somewhere in the heavenly courts a showroom opens onto the skyline of the New Jerusalem. Its paperwork bears the motto "Harpmakers to the cosmos since time immemorial."

This showroom too is filled with harps – hand-crafted, hand-carved, gold-encrusted, gleaming harps. They are all tuned up and ready to play in the key of praise. They don't have serial numbers, but artistically engraved into each harp is a name.

And one of those names – is YOURS.
