Diluting the Gospel with External Viewpoints;
Series Part 4 – The Philosophers Apostle Paul met in Athens

Ancient Greek philosophers used the term Logos in many different ways. Aristotle, for example, uses Logos as one of the three categories for making a persuasion appeal – Ethos, Pathos, and Logos. Aristotle suggests that a good speech should contain the three elements: Ethos - appealing to the moral aspect of the person (the word ethics comes from ethos); Pathos - appealing to the emotional aspect (the word pathetic comes from pathos); Logos - appealing to the logical aspect (the word logic comes from logos). The impact of logos on the audience is sometimes called the argument's logical appeal. We can use this technique to persuade our audience; that the ideas we present are valid or more valid than someone else's.

Ethos (credibility) - stands for the character of the author and is called the Ethical Appeal. It is convincing the audience that the presenter is likable and worthy of listening. Ethos answers the questions about the trustworthiness of the presenter or his/her reputation and it exists independently of the message presented. For example, a person who has personal warmth is more likely to persuade us. It is suggested from experts that if you plan to use "I" in your discourse, you should at least attach little phrase in front of it. Example, "as the Elder of the Church, I advise you..." or "As a car mechanic, I recommend you..." Using "I", without the other "phrase" attempting to build your credibility for ethos into the mind of your audience, could lead to disaster. It could just create a sense of the generic

nobody. Please note: every personal thing that the presenter brings to the discussion eventually will work against or in favor of building his credibility in the minds of the listeners.

Pathos (emotion) - stands for persuading by appealing to the person's emotions and is called the Emotional Appeal. It triggers the sympathies and the imagination of the audience. Pathos gives the opportunity to the speaker to emotionally connect to the audience. It could make the listeners (with their imagination) feel pain or happiness along with the presenter. How this can be achieved? One way to do this is by giving a story. Please note that the story is usually given with the intention to turn off the logic! Once this is achieved, the story becomes something palpable and present. The values and beliefs of the presenter are carried imaginatively and emotionally with the story. Looking from the point of view of the listeners - once they get into that emotional mood, they become trapped, their judgment corrupted, and they could become mindless of the concepts and consequences which has been presented. In other words, they could become victims, depending on the mercy of the presenter's ethical and moral values. No wonder, because of the "manipulating power" that carries, many scholars over the centuries have considered Pathos the strongest of the appeals. Usually, people like presenters that flatter them; particularly if the listeners identify themselves with the image being created. Who does not want to be that sensible and caring person being described in the story? If the presenter wants the listener to assess something negatively, he may try to awaken their anger. Remember how Nathan

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approached David. In 2 Samuel 12:5 we read, "And David's anger was greatly kindled against the man". If somebody has received benefits without deserving them, what do we feel? We feel anger towards him. David felt the same. Then, in verse 7, Nathan said to David, "Thou art the man". This approach produced enormous repenting effect on David.

Logos (logic) - stands for persuading by logical reasoning and it is often called the Logical Appeal. Aristotle believed that Logos should be the core of the persuasion appeal and the presenter should focus on this the most. This statement cannot be emphasized enough. We can divide Logos into two – inductive and deductive. The inductive logic is done by giving the audience several similar examples and then forming a general proposition from them. The logic here is pretty simple - often leading to the "there you go conclusion". Deductive logic is done by giving the audience a few general propositions and then drawing from them a specific "new truth". This leads to a statement like "because such-and-such is true and such-and-such is true" then "we should agree on this other thing". The main points of Logos are: internal consistency of the message, clarity of the claim, and the effectiveness of the supporting evidences.

These three techniques are used by many experienced speakers and leaders today. Here is a simple example to illustrate them: Ethos – "The doctor told me that I have to take Paracetamol to reduce my fever." This sentence speaks about the authority and respect of the doctor. The doctor can be trusted. Pathos – "If you do not take this

medicine (Paracetamol) you may die." This brings the emotion into action; it pulls the string of fear. Logos – "For over 100 years it was clinically proven and tested, in USA and Europe, that Paracetamol is the most effective drug for fighting pain and fever." Here is when the logic comes into place "it has been proven and tested". Then it is logical.

A well designed billboard, for example, should contain these three elements. In this case, it could be a mixture of pictures, words, colors, and other - but all three will speak to you at the same time and you'll wonder - what makes you get off that "road exit" for a "good" or "wrong" reason? The first thing we observe when we stand in front of a speaker is to evaluate him/her from an ethical point of view - the way he/she dresses, his/her credentials, his/her morals. Can we trust him/her? The second is the emotional aspect. Is he/she relating to us, to our problems? Is he/she distant and cold? Finally – the logic. Does his/her thesis make sense? Is it sound and clear? At the end, the balance of all these three leads us to fall in love and accept, or reject what was presented. As an example, countless votes had been cast, during the election time, for the candidates who master and balance those three. Later in our discussions we will put to the test Pope Francis's speech about the Big Bang and Evolution theories in front of the audience of the Pontifical Academy of Sciences. We may be surprised how well he scores on the Ethos, Pathos, and Logos test (the Aristotle's test) for judging a persuasion appeal. We may discover how well he pulls these three strings, like a well-trained harp player, to convey the audience into his adventure.

As he did this, he noticed that many of the apples had become quite bruised. He set those aside in another basket.

When he had finished separating the apples, he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl, "I'm so sorry I knocked over your apples. I hope I didn't entirely ruin your day. Here, please take this. He stopped, then slowly made his way to board another flight with that question burning in his soul: "Are you Jesus?"

Lampyridae

Bugs of the family Lampyridae are special little insects that can produce light with chemicals in their bodies. This chemical reaction is called bioluminescence. Different individuals produce different types and amounts of light – some yellow, some green, some red. They use the light to communicate.

When I was growing up, I would catch fireflies, as we called them, then let them go and wait for them to blink “goodbye” to me. That is still the first signal to me that it is summer – when I can catch a firefly. Some people call them lightning bugs. Some call them glowworms, even though they are not worms at all. What do you call them?
