He started talking to Uncle Fred and LeNoy picked up part of the conversation where Brother Harrison said he'd be back with some slides that would be quite interesting. LeNoy attended the Methodist Church with his family. On Sunday, he told his mom that Mr. Harrison was coming to show some pictures. His mom, dad, and sister came and the strip slide machine started to roll. Mr. Harrison opened with prayer & then started talking and showing slides about Jesus, the second coming, etc. Although somewhat surprised, LeNoy & his family continued through the entire series. Many subjects were touched upon including clean & unclean foods. After that LeNoy's dad got rid of their unclean foods. It wasn't long and LeNoy, his sister, his dad & mom all got baptized in 1954.

Judy said a literature evangelist (formerly known as colporteurs) came to her mother's door and sold the book, "Bible Readings for the Home." He also invited the family to take Bible studies and their response was they would love to. After studying, Judy's mother joined the SDA Church in 1944 – Judy was only 2 ½ years old. Her dad started having some Sabbath issues but eventually they were resolved and he became baptized and he, himself, became a literature evangelist. Thus, Judy was brought up in an SDA home.

LeNoy learned hearing aid audiology and took his skill & business knowledge to Spartanburg. Overall, he accumulated 53 years of experience working with the hard-of-hearing. He became the Chairman of the Licensing Commission. Once retired, LeNoy received an outstanding letter of recognition from DHEC (Department of Hearing Education Commission). For most of the many years working as a hearing aid specialist, Judy worked right by his side as his personal secretary.

Currently the Kyzers live in SC off Cedar Hill Drive. LeNoy has a full-time job keeping up their "farm," its trails, trees, grass, garden, etc. Judy, as well as LeNoy, gets up and studies, eats breakfast, and on Mondays she works at our Thrift Store. She grocery shops with Barb Sanders on Tuesdays, and happily spends quality time in the kitchen. # **Worship Can Affect Your Genes**

With the special series of prayer meetings this January, it seemed like a good time to look at prayer. In this case, I'm going back to a remarkable It Is Written program that I saw a few weeks ago, presented by John Bradshaw, as usual, with guest Dr. James Marcum, cardiologist who practices in the Chattanooga area. The opening question on the program was,"How does worship affect your life?"

For starters, Dr. Marcum presents the idea of worship to his patients as something they should consider, both for short-term and eternal benefit. The patient's response often is, "How can that help?" Dr. Marcum likes to refer to our inherited genes as our "hardware", which can't be changed, while our lifestyle practices he calls our "software." Next, we all have a few "bad" genes he says, like a gene that may give us a predisposition to a chronic disease. Undue stress on these genes can result in symptoms. These stresses might be called "software" issues.

Probably the most remarkable point in the entire program, for me, was that worshiping the true God has benefits for our genetics. You may have heard the term "epigenetic," which refers to behaviors which affect our genes, but without changing the DNA sequence. To use Dr. Marcum's analogy, "We can influence hardware by software." For example, he cites an original study by Dr. Andrew Newberg of the University of Pennsylvania, who discovered that in people who worshipped for short periods of time, the prefrontal cortex of the brain grew larger. This area of the brain is where many higherlevel functions take place affecting social behavior, right and wrong, consequences of our actions, speech and language, and much more.

Conversely, he learned that with worship, the source of stress in the brain was reduced. Thus the source of epigenetic problems like aging and deterioration of DNA were "turned down" in people who worship.

So one of Dr. Marcum's conclusions is that when stresses ("software") are reduced, every chronic disease improves. Aging slows down. Inflammation is reduced. Blood pressure is reduced, and the immune system is improved. Even ten minutes of worship daily can have very positive effects, by lowering the risk of chronic diseases, heart attack, infection, diabetes, and hypertension.

As an example of how it can work, Dr. Marcum described the case of a Wall Street businessman, who had sought answers from other doctors. He came to Dr. Marcum with multiple problems relating to his heart, made worse by the high pressure business environment of New York City. He was unable to walk more than short distances. The man was not a Christian, had no church connection, and knew nothing about worship when Dr. Marcum introduced him to it. They established a program that included daily worship, and now the man can walk long distances, has greatly reduced his hours at the office and as a matter of fact, as of the program time, was planning to quit his job, move to Montana and buy a small ranch!

While various kinds of worship are now known to have

measurable health benefits, such as the New York businessman experienced, and some of them pretty remarkable, we should not approach worship as a cure. At the same time, according to Dr. Marcum, studies by [Jeff] Dusek, Harvard University and Benson's Lab are showing that several factors, including "repetitive prayer" result in improvements in chronic disease.

Remember Psalm 95:6, "Oh come, let us worship and bow down; Let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (NKJV). As John Bradshaw stated, "People living a life disconnected from God are missing out spiritually and physically." The next challenge to researchers is to study Biblical worship in particular and its different forms; given what we know now, it could be that particular forms of worship could have a more pronounced effect on our DNA.

Near the end of the Bible we find that core verse, Rev. 14:7, "...Fear God and give glory to Him, for the hour of His judgment has come; and worship him who made heaven and earth, the sea and springs of water." Worship is expected of Jesus' followers; it is urged upon us, and even without what the scriptures say, we can be motivated by scientific evidence. Epigenetics shows that what we do can affect our genes, resulting in a better life.

You can see the It Is Written program, "The Physiology of Worship," online. A couple of important books are: *The Ultimate Prescription: What the Medical Profession Isn't Telling You* by Dr. James Marcum, and *How God Changes Your Brain* by Dr. Andrew Newberg, with Mark Waldman.

# American Goldfinch

Did everyone enjoy the beautiful snow we had recently? The thing I liked best was that all the songbirds around our place came to get the sunflower seed Ronnie put out. We saw more kinds in a day than we'd seen all winter!

One of my favorites is the American goldfinch. It's a small finch (only 4-5 inches long) with a conical bill and a short, notched tail. Adult males in spring and early summer are bright yellow with black and white markings. Adult females are duller yellow beneath, olive above. Winter birds are drab, unstreaked brown, with blackish wings and two pale wingbars.

These active and acrobatic little finches cling to weeds and seed socks, and sometimes mill about in large numbers at feeders or on the ground beneath them. Goldfinches fly with a bouncy, undulating pattern and often call in flight, drawing attention to themselves. I can't wait until we get to heaven when these beautiful little birds will be tame again!
