

Getting to Know You

It is so wonderful that God knows the end from the beginning. As long as I can remember, I have wanted to be either a nurse or a teacher. My Mother said that when I was only a year old, I carried a book around, often upside down, talking incessantly as I pretended to read. I grew up as a Seventh-day Adventist although I attended public schools. The small church of about 25 members where my family attended was 20 miles away. My father once said, "We have to be perfect." Thus, my brothers and I were reared on earning our way to heaven. Not surprisingly, my three brothers left the church at 18 once they got out of high school. I managed to stay in the church largely due to our minister visiting our home. After hearing about my desire to be a teacher, he lost no time in talking to the educational superintendent. Both visited us shortly and dangled a scholarship in front of me and in less than a week, I was on the campus of Atlantic Union College about 300 miles away. I started during the second semester and continued through summer school (10 weeks). I actually started teaching elementary education at age 19. I had started school at five years old so was ahead of schedule.

I taught school for a total of 43 years both in New York for 27 years and in South Carolina for six years. I taught in Cortland, New York for 20 of those 27 years; it was a three-teacher school. Throughout my teaching

career, I taught grades one through eight. The students and I had fun together and I still hear from some of my past students on Facebook today.

After teaching for seven years at Cortland, New York, I noticed that writing at the chalk board was quite uncomfortable; I felt a tiny, hard lump under a dimple in my left arm. After numerous doctor visits and exam, it was the consensus the left arm had to be removed due to cancer (and yes, I was left-handed). Tears came to my eyes and a lump came to my throat but I prayed almost continuously and God's presence became so real and close that Phil 4:13 became a reality: "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheth me." I was out of school for two months but returned to teach 21 students in four grades with no aide. During worship the tension was unbelievable, the children averting their eyes if I looked at them. Afterwards I started talking about losing my arm. Then kids opened up asking questions, "Were you asleep? Where did they get the skin to sew you up? How much did it cost? If you had a baby, would it be born with one arm? The love of Jesus flowed out of their hearts and they wound up being the best therapy in the world being so good to me. My students would help me and write on the board for me among other things. It amazed me the way they would put one arm behind their backs or inside their shirts and play at recess or do their school work with one hand. One little boy would come running up and throw his arms around me as he had lost his mother to cancer.

Regarding my spiritual experience, when I went to college I was doing the

right things outwardly but it wasn't the close walk with the Lord I needed. I wanted to be a good role model and the Lord worked on my heart causing me to experience a true conversion. After my mother died and my best friend moved to Maine, I was ready for a change. Our minister and wife had moved to North Carolina and they talked to the education superintendent and his influence helped secure me a teaching job at Columbia Jr. Academy in South Carolina near Lexington. Even today during camp meeting at Lake Junaluska, I run into one of my student's mother who hugs me every time.

After reaching retirement at 61, I worked as a companion at Tryon Estates through Home Health for two years. Then I went for my CNA

at Isothermal College. I finished and trained at St. Luke's, Tryon Estates, and White Oak. I worked at Tryon Estates for one client at a time and was there for about 13 ½ years and retired at 76 ½ years old.

A typical day for me is getting up between 6 – 7 a.m.; showering, dressing, and devotions. I get breakfast for Mei-Mei (my little Shih-Tzu dog) and myself by 9 a.m. I eat again about 2 or 3 p.m. and maybe a piece of fruit in the evening. I am a lacto-ovo vegetarian. My hobbies include making greeting cards (I have 400 rubber stamps), calling and visiting people that are sick, walking the dog around the lake at Tryon Estates, and reading. My favorite Bible verses are Isaiah 41:10, Isaiah 41:13, and Philippians 4:13.



HEAR2HELP Seminar, Tuesday, April 17, 6 - 7 p.m., Morgan Center. Anyone who has contact with people in the community is encouraged to join us for this training/informative seminar.

H2H is a collaboration between PF3 and Foothills Health Network that provides and disseminates information on community health and wellness resources, as well as information about how to access these resources in Polk County. The program is volunteer-based and utilizes agency personnel (who have ongoing contact and relationships with the community) to more efficiently educate on resource availability. H2H volunteers listen to the needs of local residents and identify gaps and barriers to access. H2H works with collaborating agencies by providing volunteer and staff training on the H2H program that includes a Community Resource Guide that will be updated as needed.

The H2H program is looking for interested organizations to participate, hence their request to use our church in the pilot project within the faith-based community. I will be the liaison for this outreach opportunity.

Building Update

From the Building Committee
I would like to give you an update as to where we are as a building committee.

We need to have approval from the Tryon Zoning and Planning Commission. In order to get that we needed Plans to submit from an architect. We have secured an architect and the plans were brought to the Town of Tryon last week. These are not full building plans, they are just views of the building. The final plans will be available in a few weeks from now.

The Zoning and Planning Commission should meet in two weeks and give us approval for our building. Once approved they will issue our Building permit, then we can move forward with the building structure. First we need to do the grading and then the building structure can go up.

I would expect this to take somewhere between 1.5 - 2 months from receipt of the building permit.

Of course, this all depends on the amount of work the builder has in front of us and of course on the weather.

Once the building is up we will have to do the electrical service, plumbing, Air conditioning and heat. Then we can start on the inside walls to make the individual rooms.

MORGAN CENTER REMODEL

We got the first round of congregation input as to the remodel of the Morgan Center. We will do two more survey's to get an accurate overview of what the congregation best wants for the Morgan Center.

Thank you all for the survey's you filled out so far. After the first survey (26) it looks like Kitchen remodel is the highest priority, with the Gym remodel and a Conference Room coming in 2nd and 3rd. Expanding the Gym and more Class Room's came in 4th and 5th respectfully. This will possibly change as we get more surveys filled out.

We will do our best to keep you informed as time goes on as to what is happening and when.

Summer of Fire

Yellowstone's "Summer of Fire" in 1988 devastated that pristine park... but only momentarily. Within days, each burned area began sprouting with new life. First came grasses. Bluebirds and woodpeckers gravitated to dead tree stands, happily making their nests. Bears and elk found the burned bark and lush, new growth to be nutritious, superior food sources.

While one-third of the aspen trees within northern Yellowstone burned, the stands were not all lost. In fact, in the years following the fire, aspen seeds found bare, nutrient-rich soil where old growth once stood, and now there are more aspen in Yellowstone than before. Lodgepole pines also thrive due to the heat and clearing caused by forest fires.

Imagine: Before sin entered our perfect world, provision was made for new life to grow and thrive after a natural disaster. Could we ever doubt God's wisdom in our lives, knowing that He sees each sparrow that falls and the number of hairs on each head? How can we doubt His mercy when we see how He provides for the forest even as it is in peril? It is as if God walks among the fiery tree stands, carefully opening His hand and scattering new seed exactly where it needs to grow.
