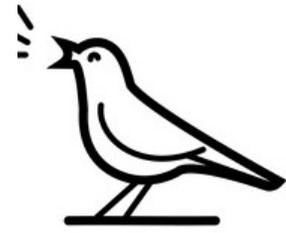

The Divine Rule of Faith
My Utmost for His Highest, Oswald Chambers

In the sermon on the mount, Christ's exhortation was to be generous in our behavior to all men. In the spiritual life be aware of walking according to natural affinities. Everyone has natural affinities; some people we like and others we do not like. We must never let those likes and dislikes rule in our Christian life. "If we walk in the light as God is in the light," God will give us communion with people for whom we have no natural affinity.

The example our Lord gives us is not that of a good man, or even a good Christian, but of God himself. "Be therefore perfect even as your Father in heaven is perfect," show to other men what God has shown to you; and God will give us ample opportunities in actual life to prove whether we are perfect as our Father in heaven is perfect. To be a disciple means that we deliberately identify ourselves with God's interest in others. "That you love one another; as I have loved you..."

The expression of Christian character is not good doing, but in God likeness. If the spirit of God has transformed you from within, you will exhibit divine characteristics in your life, not good human characteristics. God's life in us expresses itself as God's life, not as human life trying to be godly. The secret of a Christian is that the supernatural is made natural in him by the grace of God, and the experience of this works out in the practical details of life, not in times of communion with God. When we come into contact with things that create a buzz, we find to our amazement that we have power to keep wonderfully poised in the center of it all.

Nature Nugget -- Earthquakes

An earthquake is what happens when two blocks of the earth suddenly slip past one another. The surface where they slip is called the fault or fault plane. We often think of famous faults like the San Andreas Fault in California, which caused the disastrous 1906 San Francisco earthquake, but there are faults all over the world. Some of the faults here in the Southeastern U.S. are the Brevard Fault Zone here in NC, the Middleton Place Summerville Seismic Zone (near Charleston, SC), and the one in the Sequatchie Valley in TN, where I'm from.

The Anatolian transform fault system is one of the most active in the world and it is the East Anatolian fault zone that has caused very destructive earthquakes in Turkey recently. Earthquakes are recorded by instruments called seismographs and the recording they make is called a seismogram. Scientists use the seismogram recordings made on the seismographs at the surface of the earth to determine how large the earthquake was. The size of the earthquake is called its magnitude. The magnitude of earthquakes is measured on a 10 point scale, where 10 would be the biggest and most violent.

There have been several earthquakes in NC and some have reached a magnitude of 5 or even 7, but most earthquakes here are 2.5 or less. On the other hand, the earthquake in Turkey was a 7.8, with a 7.5 aftershock. An aftershock is an earthquake that occurs following, and near the epicenter of, the main large-magnitude earthquake. Unfortunately, a single earthquake can be followed by repeated aftershocks and while they usually decrease in magnitude, they can still be very destructive. We all need to pray for the people of Turkey and Syria and everyone affected by these earthquakes.

In Matthew 24:7, Jesus says, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places." All the troubles that we see around us are signs that He is coming back soon. Let's all make the best use of our time that we can so we can be ready when He comes. I want to be in Heaven with Him, don't you?

On behalf of the Tryon Seventh-day Adventist Church School we want to begin by thanking God and you for the many ways in which our school has been blessed just within the 2022/23 year.

We have beautiful landscaping and a new front door that operates properly and has a window that is 300 times safer than tradition glass to keep our children safe.

We have a fourth teacher (a local hire) to teach PreK/K, a space that is adorably suited for young minds to learn and experience new things, complete with an added restroom.

The teachers are dedicated to not just educating the mind, but also the growth of character and development of a heart for others and the joys found in a relationship with Jesus Christ.

Our students enjoy experiencing hands-on learning and our parents and families are supportive of them and the school.

We have an active Home and School that provides awesome activities and a forum to strengthen communication between parents, teachers and students.

We receive tremendous support from the church members, friends, supporters and the Thrift Store, both monetary or with “boots on the ground.”

With all the blessings we have shared, there is a specific need we have at this time. We need your financial help to cover operating expenses for March, April and May. Our budget accounted for a few more students and the additional expenditures has drained our savings.

In my (Deb’s) 42 years here at Tryon I cannot tell you when, if ever, the school board came before the church asking for monies specific for operating expenses; special needs, specific projects -- sure, but not operating expenses.

We need \$10,000 for the month of March, \$10,000 for the month of April and \$10,000 for the month of May -- a total of \$30,000.

Please note: we do not see this need as an ongoing issue. There are already additional students/families interested in enrolling for August. NOTE TO THE PARENTS: we will not put the shortfall on your monthly tuition. Tuition beginning in August 2023 will only be raised \$15 for each student.

Another need we have is giving of “sweat equity.” The person cleaning the school is no longer able to provide that service. That is a change that helps our monthly expenditures, however, cleaning still needs to take place. It would be of great help if we could have volunteers clean the school for March, April and May.

It does not have to be one person on a weekly basis; it could be a church ministry group, a Sabbath School Class, a group of friends, a few parents or a family doing mission work right here on our school campus. Imagine that, helping a school ministry without needing a passport or plane ticket!

There Had to be Another Name

Don't know how you feel about "deviled eggs," but since I've been an Adventist I have recoiled just a bit at the phrase. Of course, everyone knows what to call them at the fellowship dinners. They are always popular. Just ask Art Smith, Florida restaurateur who has had them on his menu "longer than he can remember," according to writer Holly Kapherr. She also reports that a web search for recipes for deviled eggs turned up 24 million responses.

Then, Ms. Kapherr points out some common alternate names for these "things," shall I say. Finding another name was necessary in many places she says, because of puritanical attitudes going back to colonial America. Serving a dish with a Satanic association was definitely unacceptable at potlucks and church socials. So what did they come up with? Some of the more frequently used names are "mimosa eggs" (my favorite), "stuffed eggs," "dressed eggs" and "salad eggs." Call them what you will, these "dressed eggs" have continued to be a staple, some say, of southern cuisine in particular and very handy for entertaining, made easier by the introduction of the Tupperware "Deviled Egg Taker" years ago.

Many of the accounts of the origins of "dressed eggs" begin with ancient Rome where eggs were a staple, eaten with any meal. The ultra rich took delight in impressing their friends with lavish dinners, which included exotic dishes that would horrify conservationists today. Just imagine a plate of flamingo tongues! Well, the first course in any well appointed Roman household was called the "gustum", comprised of cheeses, mushrooms, fruit, and...eggs. Boiled eggs they say signaled that exquisite food was coming. Accompanying the eggs there was a condiment that the Romans (somehow) enjoyed, called "garum," which was a fermented sauce made

either from fish or barley. Hard to imagine! The Romans even had a common saying, "ab ova usque ad mala," which has been translated as "from eggs to apples."

That was the beginning. Fast forward to the 13th century, when the egg yolks were beaten up with spices and a strong sauce, put back into the two halves, then skewered to hold them together. Through the centuries the cooks in several countries seemed to enjoy experimenting with all the savory spices they could get their hands on, creating countless variations on the filling. There seemed to be a sort of evolution, heading toward highly spiced and hot eggs. In this environment, the term "deviled" was used generally to refer to hot, spicy food, so naturally eggs with a spicy filling became "deviled eggs." And this term, according to AncestralFindings.com, appeared in print the first time in 1786. The first published recipe in the U.S. according to Wikipedia was in a Montgomery, Alabama newspaper in 1877.

Thus, deviled eggs found their way into the mainstream of American food, though not usually the extremely hot variety, even entering cookbooks. And what about mayo, which was very handy for holding the ingredients together? Supposedly the first cookbook to call for mayo in deviled eggs came out in 1896, and by the 1940's recipes for deviled eggs were everywhere. What the Florida restaurateur called "church lady deviled eggs" continue to be a popular item—and one I always look for at "fellowship dinners."

The Cleansing of the Sanctuary


"I will come again," He said, "and raise the righteous dead."
