Recognizing God Echoing God's Love by Charles Mills

He that has seen me has seen the father. John 14:9

A low fog bank hugged the waters as our big freighter sailed cautiously through the wide mouth of the harbor. I strained to see beyond the mists, but my 4 year old eyes recognized nothing among the soft, liquid curtains.

It was my very first visit to America, having spent my entire life, short as it was, in eastern Asia, where my parents served as Christian missionaries. But it wasn't necessarily the United States that was the goal of my gaze that cold, damp morning. No, I was looking for an even more wondrous site. I was looking for my Grandma.

After all, I'd heard so much about her. My mom had told me stories of the kind hearted woman in whose care she'd grown up -- stories of depression years when food was scarce but love wasn't, when Christmas presents had been handmade because the family had no extra money to spend. I knew in my little boy heart that somewhere beyond that fog bank waited a woman who loved me just as she had loved my mother. To me, Grandma and America were almost one in the same.

Suddenly, as our boat slipped through the glassy waters, I saw a figure begin to emerge from the mist. A tall, beautiful woman holding high a gleaming torch. "Mommy!" I cried, running along the damp, salty deck. "Mommy, there she is. There's Grandma!"

The image in my mind of a kind hearted woman waiting to welcome me to America fit perfectly the grand design of the Statue of Liberty. The site matched the admiration that had poured from my mother's lips whenever she had spoken of her mom.

Soon I learned that while my real grandmother was indeed kind, loving, and happy to welcome me to America, she was a lot shorter than the woman in the harbor.

God has called us to play a unique role here on earth. He's asked us to shower our friends and neighbors with stories about Him, testimonies of Him, and invitations from Him. He's depending on us to make Him so real to our hearers, so filled with love and kindness, that when they discover Him working in their lives or hear Him whispering in their ears, they'll recognize Him immediately.

That's why Jesus came to earth and lived among us, eating our food, wearing our clothes, sharing our sorrows. He wanted to show us, in no uncertain terms, what God is like.

What image of our heavenly Father do you share? What picture

do your actions at home, at play, and in the workplace paint in the people's mind? Will those who know you be able to recognize the God you worship based on your reflection of Him?

One Christian writer put it this way: "We cannot by searching find out God. But He has revealed Himself in the character of Christ, who is the brightness of the Father's glory and the express image of His person. If we desire a knowledge of God, we must be Christlike" (Ellen G. White, Manuscript Releases, Vol. 21, p. 410).

The same is true if we desire to share Him with our world.

Turkey Day? Why Not Pie Day?

Writing about Thanksgiving requires dipping into the past, because the holiday's roots started in 1621, although there had been other, smaller thanksgivings earlier. My dad called such a feast a "repast", whenever he sat down to a big

Thanksgiving dinner. That was an old word even then! When Governor William Bradford organized that "first" feast, it's unlikely that the Pilgrims called it "Thanksgiving", although they were thankful for their harvest. It's certain that much of the food was based on Native American dishes of the Wampanoag Indians who were invited to the three-day celebration. Without an oven, of course, and surely without any sugar at all, desserts as we know them were simply absent. (1) Years later the settlers edged closer to pumpkin pie when they scooped out the seeds and soft pulp from inside the pumpkin, then added honey, spices and milk to create a sort of custard—this according to History Channel. (2)

It should be said that the relationship with the Indians was not really as friendly as we'd like to think. There had been serious friction with some other tribes, and disagreements even among the Wampanoag, who contributed several deer to the feast. Their help was so important that the remaining Pilgrims would have had little chance of surviving the second winter without their assistance. (3)

The food that day also included wild turkey, of course, Indian corn (probably in the form of Indian Pudding), turnips, strawberries, dried blueberries, and very likely pumpkins, plus fish and other vegetables and greens. It's interesting to note that by 1779 a lady wrote to a friend with her Thanksgiving menu which included, among other items, three kinds of pie: apple, mincemeat, and pumpkin. (4)

The nature of Thanksgiving dinner and the attitude of all present were well established by the early 1800's. Take this excerpt from the December 1, 1836 New-Bedford Mercury for example, which states: "it is absolutely requisite to a proper observance of Thanksgiving, that at least three dinners should be eaten up in one... It is a day of universal stuffing. The dinner is the all important item...turkeys, geese and chickens...Then come puddings and pies...among the most prominent of which is that savory dish...[the indispensable item] at Thanksgiving dinner—the well filled, deep and spacious pumpkin pie. This concludes the feast—and for the remainder of the day, a drowsy dullness is very apt to prevail". (5)

One wonders about the devoted women and girls who prepared the sumptuous meal. Back in 1887, Maria Parloa was concerned about them. Her words in Miss Parloa's Kitchen Companion ring true today: "Remember that the chief aim is to produce happiness, and that many of the company will not be wholly happy if the mistress of the house must pass a good part of the day in the kitchen." The more "preparations made in advance the better, so as to relieve the housekeeper of as many duties and as much anxiety as possible..." (6)

Some may say when the food is gone, all is forgotten. However, a 21st Century writer says a couple of important things: 1. Pies are the "holiday part" of Thanksgiving, and 2. Thanksgiving pies have a way of living on in the memory. (7) Another writes, when the kids and "grands" return to show their love and affection for the "old folks", they are also coming to honor the roast turkeys and pumpkin pies as well. (8) Of course, overindulgence is always a possibility, but the great English poet/philosopher John Milton argued that eating and enjoying the good that God has given us is a way of showing our appreciation of these things. He goes so far as to say, "To refrain, when bounty has been given us, is an evidence of ingratitude to the Giver".

This dinner, according to the New York Times, 11-30-1854, should be the most notable of the year, like a thing of beauty—a joy forever. The [images] of our good dinners come up to comfort us years later, "when those who partook with us have passed on. So may this Thanksgiving be a hearty and happy one, and none but pleasant days meet you till the return of another." (9)


The Journey by Rosanne Richards




